Jack Dempsey Needle Art quilt squares can be made into a variety of different things. Here we've made a table runner using 2 of the 18" quilt squares, pattern 308.


Items needed to complete this project: hoop, needle, floss, fabric, batting.

1) Complete the embroidery of your chosen square as directed on the package.
2) Cut three 18 " squares out of the fabric of your choice. Then cut across the diagonal on two of the squares to make a total of 4 triangles for the ends. This makes the top and bottom of each triangle. The 3rd square should be cut in half to make two rectangles for the middle section.

3) Cut one piece of fabric of your choice for the bottom of the table runner.

This piece should be 45 " long $\times 18$ " wide.

4) Take 1 triangle with the diagonal side that you cut and place it on the end of 1 quilt square with the right sides together. Sew a 3/8" seam across. Do this with the other quilt square as well.
5) Take 1 of the rectangles cut from the fabric and place it on the opposite end of the quilt square you just attached the triangle to, with right sides together and sew. Attach the other quilt square to the opposite side of the rectangle. It should look like the design in the picture above. It's the top layer.
6) Attach the other 2 triangles to each end of the 45 " long piece of fabric. This makes the bottom piece.
7) For a nice flat but quilted look, we used a warm and natural type batting. Lay the top piece on top of your batting and cut in the exact same shape. Using a long stitch on your machine or hand basting long stitches, baste the wrong side of the top layer to the batting.
8) Place the bottom layer with right sides together on top of the combined top layer that's attached to the batting. Pin all the way around leaving a 6 inch opening on one side of the table runner near the center piece of fabric. This will allow you to turn it right side out after sewing around the edges. Sew all the way around, except the 6 inches. Remove pins. Clip the 2 pointed ends of the triangles so they will not be bulky when turned right side out.
9) Turn right side out by pushing fabric through the 6 inch opening.
10) Flatten as much as possible without applying any heat to the ink on the quilt squares.

Pin all the way around the edges making sure the entire piece is flattened to your liking. Pin throughout the middle also, to keep areas you want to quilt flat.
Make sure the opening area edges are folded in neatly. Using desired thread color (we used white thread above) stitch a $1 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ from the edge, all the way around the table runner.
11) Sew a seam down each side of the rectangle and across the opposite end of the quilt square at the triangle. Quilt as necessary.
12) Wash when completed in cold water. Hang dry until ink is washed out to your satisfaction.
